Sure enough, it's Winter, the snow has started, and of course the questions start being asked: "Is the Loop closed at Deer Creek?" "Is the road open at all?" "Is there power past Sand Hill?" All the questions and answers can now be easily found on Facebook! But every now and then, people mention some "landmark", and not too surprisingly, one that appears quite often is "the old store in Verlot", or for those in the know, "Green Gables Store".

There was once a fairly thriving collection of businesses on Mountain Loop. There was one right by the Falls that changed from tavern to snack bar to restaurant over the years. There was the well-known Canyon Creek Lodge, which burned once, was rebuilt to even greater fame, and ultimately burned again right on the side of the highway, the location now marked only by a number of large rocks in a line. The Robe Restaurant, later known as "Tina's" and as the "Mountain View Inn" operated for decades, and was for a time the only motel in the area. At the far end of the southern leg of the Loop was the Big Four Inn, a tourist destination for several decades starting in the early 1920s, eventually lost to fire in 1949.

Mr. and Mrs. Ab Cosa have been improving their home near Turlo. The gables have been painted green and the house has been given the name of "Green Gables". The rooms downstairs are finished alike in selected knotted cedar, oiled. A fireplace, built of brick and veneered with stone inside the building is completed on the west end. Another fireplace is to be built on the east end. There is a public reception room, a large living room, a bedatoom, a bath room, kitchen and dining nook on the ground floor.

But the one business that seemed to survive through thick and thin was "Green Gables", a house turned into a restaurant, with property around it that became a resort in itself. There were rental cabins, of course, but there were also people who lived on the property full-time. It

was a place to stop after a day of exploring. It was a place to hold meetings for a variety of organizations. It was even a place for a former owner to return, re-purchase, and re-marry!

"GREEN GABLES" NEW RESORT ON MOUNTAIN HIGHWAY ROUTE

"Green Gables", a new resort on the Mountain Loop Highway route near Verlot, has been opened this spring by Mr. and Mis. Ab Gosa.

The main building is 30x40 and is made of natural logs with knotted cedar finish. There is a tavern room and a dining room, and sleeping rooms are now being completed upstairs.

The property includes eighty acres of ground, with a quarter of a mile of frontage on the Stillaguamish River, and an excellent swimming hole. A picnic grounds is now being prepared.

Although the "Green Gables" will not be entirely completed this year, it is now open, providing lunches, sandwiches and Sunday chicken din ners.

On May 7, 1936 the newspaper in Granite Falls mentioned the improvements being made to the home of Ab and Anna Gosa. By the following month, the Jun 11 newspaper spoke of the new "resort"! From the very start, it was intended as a friendly place to stop and enjoy.

Mr Gosa passed away in 1939, but the new owners, Mr and Mrs Stacey carried on the tradition of hospitality.

EDMONDS BOY SCOUTS SPEND WEEK END AT "GREEN GABLES"

The Oct 5,1950 issue told of a visit by the Camp Fire Girls and their

outdoor adventures. Other issues told of a variety of scout meetings, fire department meetings, ladies auxiliary meetings, etc., many of which rotated between Green Gables, Tina's, and other Loop businesses.

Less than a year later, the Sept 16, 1971 newspaper told of Alyce's wedding to James Nussbaum. Of course, the wedding took place at her beloved Green Gables!!

The 2014 closure of nearby Gold Basin campground nearly put Green Gables to death economically, reducing business by over 50%, but a couple Mountain Loop proponents stepped in to revive the business and strive to weave it into the community fabric again. Randy and Edith Farrell are leasing the original Green Gables building and offering refreshments, souvenirs, trails advice, and groceries to locals and tourists alike. Stepping inside the Green Gables General Store, you can enjoy the original woodwork and fireplace, and imagine the thousands of visitors that have enjoyed the setting since the mid-1930s.

Yes, it's winter, but there is one old place of business that is going strong and offers you a warm place to



stop and enjoy your trip. Maybe it's the location, maybe it's the owner/operators, maybe it's the spirits in the old building . . . but it has survived, outliving all of its contemporaries. Its survival is history in its own right, so if you're looking for a little Winter adventure, try the Loop for sledding or snowshoeing (the USFS is starting to schedule snowshoe adventures in January!). Then stop in for a little more history, good food, and good conversation at the Green Gables!
