4. End of June items – At the end of June there were a few items that did not make it into the May-June newsletter:
4-A. Passport Office video - On June 26th, we renewed the hosting of the Passport Office video created with that 360° camera. Visitors to the Passport Office often walk over to the

4-B. Everett "Time Travel" - On June 27th, we created an mp4 video of a "walkthrough" of the Everett "Time Travel" tour created in partnership with the Everett Library. The library requested a video for their permanent records, and it was then delivered to the library on July 27th. 4-C. Saving Bridge #102 (the "Falls Bridge") - Also on June 27th, we received a copy of a letter being sent from the City to County Council members asking that they consider saving Bridge #102 (the "Falls Bridge") when its replacement is built in the next couple years. The default plan as of today is to



simply dismantle the existing bridge when the new one is completed. Perhaps we can save the bridge, with maintenance support being offered by the City.

4-D. Bush House - On June 28th, **Tom Thorleifson** and **Fred Cruger** used the 360° camera to photograph the inside and outside of the <u>Bush House</u> in **Index.** They enjoyed a tour of



the historic building and had lunch at the newly-opened restaurant in the hotel. The restoration of the hotel is fantastic! Then on July 14th, the online tour of the **Bush House** was completed from pictures that were taken. It can be viewed at: https://fusion.realtourvision.com/186042

4-E. Edmonds Tribune newspaper digitization - On June 29th, we received word from Corey Smith (Sno-Isle Genealogical Society) that they are almost ready to have the Edmonds Tribune newspapers digitized by SmallTownPapers (STP), and are counting on us to partner with them much as we have done with the Sno-Isle Library in Snohomish. We will soon

submit for reimbursement for the *Snohomish Tribune* and be able to help with the *Edmonds Tribune*.

4-F. Historical photos for sale - On June 30th, we printed and framed a number of locally historical pictures for sale at the chainsaw carving event at the <u>Eagles</u> here in town. There were a few pictures each of various subjects, such as logging,



railroading, scenery, old downtown, etc. There are a few pictures left that will be available at the **Museum**'s "Rusty Junk" sale this Saturday for "Show 'n' Shine".

4-G. Debugging efforts with STP - Also on June 30th, we received word from <u>SmallTownPapers</u> that they have been working on a fix to an unusual flaw in the newspaper OCR (Optical Character Recognition) process that we uncovered while using their search capability. The fix will improve the process for newspaper pages that are physically damaged.

5. Docents/helpers/volunteers for July – We appreciate our docents and volunteers who maintain the museum and keep it open on Sundays and during the week for special requests. With their efforts, work is accomplished to keep the museum open and available to the public. If you would like to help, please email or leave a voicemail. 6. Researching and sharing info – We continue to stay busy as we look for information, find answers to questions, and share what we find. It's always amazing to receive so many varied requests throughout each month.

6-A. Bridge #102 analysis - On July 11th, we received an additional request from Kylee Moneypenny for photographic



support of her analysis on Bridge #102. Hopefully, her report will support keeping the bridge! See items 2-A and 2-H in the May-June 2023 newsletter. Click here to view the video.

6-B. CZUR vs flatbed scanning - Also on July 11th, we provided technical advice on flatbed vs. CZUR scanning in response to a request from **Sue Walde** (Stillaguamish Valley Genealogical Society) regarding PastPerfect software.

6-C. HistoryWalk and Archaeology Roadshow - On July 15th, Tom and Fred participated in the "HistoryWalk and Archaeology Roadshow" in the Longhouse at the Monroe Fairgrounds, sponsored by the Historic Preservation Commission. It was scheduled to coincide with a large event at the Fairgrounds, but that event was unfortunately cancelled



at the last minute, so foot traffic was light. It was fun nonetheless to visit with the various participants from heritage organizations across the county.

6-D. Old aerial photos for research - On July 16th, Shannon Kennedy again visited the museum, interested in researching property west of Granite Falls using historical aerial photographs. They were listed in the index, but the boxed set of 1960-era photos we rescued from the old Everett mill seems to be missing the necessary ones.

6-E. Diffley – who, what, where, when? - On July 28th, a mother/daughter team from **Spokane** stopped at the museum, based on recommendations from the <u>Everett Library</u>. They were researching ancestors named **Diffley**, and found that we had a lot of material. They left with great pictures, maps, and documents, and made a great donation to GFHS.

6-F. Melang family - On July 30th, a visitor researching her ancestors in the **Melang** family found great material and is returning next Thursday for further research, explaining that she would like to become a museum docent, as well!

7. Collecting and preserving - Our mission is to collect and to preserve history, which we love doing!

7-A. Lindgren/Cameron visit in Index - On July 3rd, Fred visited Louise Lindgren and David Cameron in Index, taking to them a full set of digitized files that were created by our CZUR scanner of the many years of work that Louise created and saved. In a digital form, they are all now fully searchable!

7-B. Only one more! - On July 20th, we received word from SmallTownPapers that the Snohomish Tribune newspapers through 1935 have been uploaded. Only one more box to go! 7-C. "New" artifacts for the museum - On July 30th during the regular Sunday noon to 5pm hours, we received a donation from Bill Rawlins of a "cone-shaped log puller" which was a



heavy iron device designed to fit on a sniped log so that it could be dragged by horses (see image above). Shortly after, **Denny Somerville** brought in two fire department hose spanners (see image below). The log cone is on the floor by the spar tree. **Denny**'s hose spanners are at the fire fighter's



display by the hand-crank siren. Look for them on your next visit. **Denny** already has two very unique items donated to the museum – an old "hit and miss" engine" in the Blacksmith

Shop area, and an old outboard motor in the lobby area. Each are beautifully and fully restored.

8. Keeping up with business – Throughout the month there are things that need to be accompished that deal with the administration and paperwork of this non-profit, and other items such as meetings or consultations to keep things in good working order. Here are July's experiences:

8-A. Railroad and Reunion Days planning - Sarah Bower started creating the Railroad and Reunion Days Dinner announcement on July 22nd. She has been gathering and sorting all the existing equipment and supplies during the month as she continues to prepare for the big Railroad Days Dinner event for the Granite Falls Alumni on October 6th.

8-B. Sharp House work - Also on July 22nd, Robin and Bob Ingraham finished the rail installation on the west and south sides of the Sharp House porch. The house looks nice now . . . all we have to do is finish removing the stacks of temporarily stored material from the bedroom and bathroom . . . and straighten out the living room . . . and the kitchen. It's amazing how much stuff was compressed in the Sharp House's back room that we removed to allow for the addition to the main building!

8-C. Free! Anybody want an antique pump organ? - We received an offer of an 80+ year old pump organ in excellent

condition. Although we don't have room anywhere for it at the museum, it would look great in any place (we already have the organ from the **Catholic Church** in town). **Tom** sent out notices to **LOSCHO** members regarding its availability. It's still available for free (that's a real deal!) and it can be picked up in **Edmonds** right away. Email **Tom** at tthorleifson@comcast.net.



8-D. ESRI (the GIS people, also known as the map people) - On July 20th, we received our annual invoice from ESRI for \$109, which covers our license to use their mapping tools for our historical map overlays, etc. These are world-renown great tools that came in handy for a new aerial map for the planner at City Hall, from whom we received reimbursement for our technical expertise.

8-E. Great work by STP - Finally on July 30th, we provided detailed examples of some OCR anomalies that occur in the OCR process at SmallTownPapers. They recently made an improvement that corrected some problems identified earlier during the scanning of the Snohomish Tribune. The newly-discovered issues do not occur often, but we've been lucky enough to find examples that can be used to design a fix. STP is quickly resolving each of the issues that have been found.

Also, they recently completed uploading 1921-1937 issues of the *Snohomish Tribune*, which GFHS has helped to facilitate. 8-F. AASLH Annual Converence - On July 5th, we received notification from AASLH (American Association for State and Local History) that "the AASLH 2023 Annual Conference is taking place on September 6-9 in Boise, Idaho. This year's conference features one workshop and three sessions that will help you and your organization prepare for the United States' 250th anniversary in 2026."

8-G. Busy Treasurer - On July 8th, **Museum Treasurer Scott Bower** started the necessary process to renew our status as a current business with the <u>WA Secretary of State</u>. The online gymnastics were completed on the 13th. Scott then forwarded

They provided a demonstration of some of the 360° camera tours (Everett Time Travel, Bush House, etc.) and played the video describing the situation with *Bridge* #102. There were no pressing matters affecting GFHS.

9. Mini reunion - On July 18th, a few folks met for an impromptu "mini reunion" at Playa Bonita. Dean Steinke, a long-time supporter of the Granite Falls Museum and member of the Granite Falls High School Class of '58, had an opportunity to visit from his home in Blaine to see old friends. A handful of guests were invited, but we had more than a handful in attendance! A few came to say "hi" at the beginning but couldn't stay. Others came by later. It was good to meet up with so many of his friends from high school, the museum,
